Enclosed is the June 2016 Investment Report which shows the financial institutions, types of investment instruments, monthly transactions, current month interest received, and the par and fair market value of investments held. The month-end cash in the bank and petty cash balances are also listed on the Cash and Investment Report. The pie chart (please see chart on attachment A) reflects the investment instruments as a percentage of the total portfolio.

This investment portfolio meets State guidelines and adheres to the City's investment policy. As of June 2016, the City's total portfolio is invested in:

The cash with fiscal agents is restricted as they are funds held and invested by an outside fiscal agent. The restrictions were set forth in the related bond indentures. As of June 2016, 9.366% of the portfolio is restricted.

In summary, the investment portfolio is secured and the City has the necessary cash to pay its bills for six months in a timely manner. Please call me at extension #5060 if you have any questions.

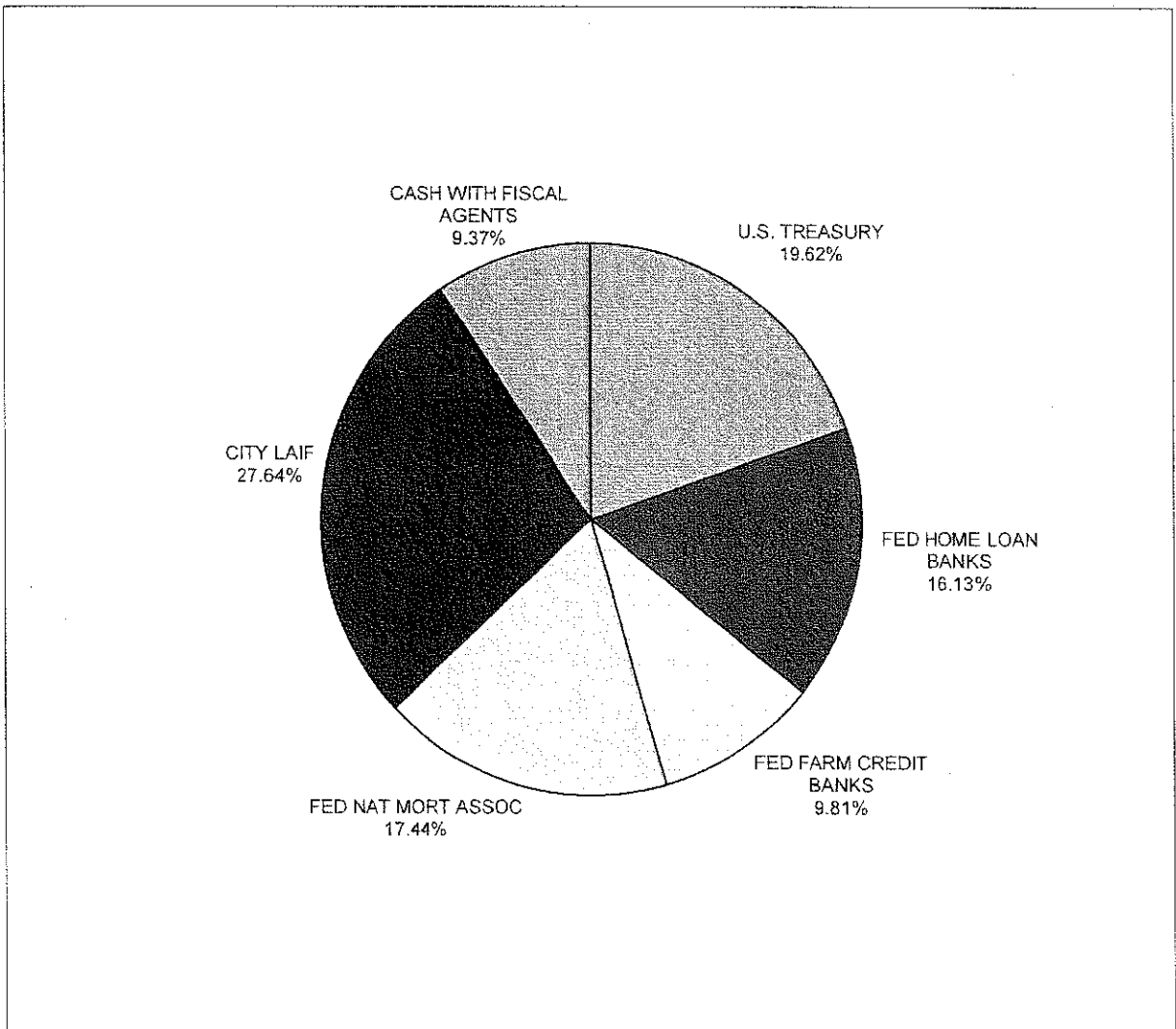

Dear Mayor Nguyen:

I write to inform you about major efforts the California Legislature is taking to combat homelessness, and to urge you to work with your counties implement these initiatives.

As you know, more than 100,000 Californians are homeless on any given day. Furthermore, homelessness is not limited to big cities in California. It affects all communities and not just those experiencing instability from their lack of housing.

California has more than one-third of the nation's chronically homeless who also likely suffer from mental illness. Of the 28,000 chronically homeless in the state, nearly 85 percent are unsheltered, and absorbing the greatest amount of taxpayers' resources. The public costs can often top \$100,000 annually per person for emergency room visits, hospital stays, law enforcement and other social services.

In response to these challenges, a bipartisan coalition of members of the California Senate launched a major initiative in January—called "No Place Like Home"—to combat homelessness. We were proud to have the support of the League of California Cities for this initiative immediately after it was introduced.

I am happy to report to you that the California Legislature and Governor have approved the provisions of the No Place Like Home initiative as part of California's 2016-17 state budget.

The landmark bipartisan legislative package will provide \$2 billion for the housing of mentally ill Californians who are also homeless. The No Place Like Home Program will be administered by the California Department of Housing and Community Development

(HCD) to further the development of permanent supportive housing for persons who are in need of mental health services and are homeless, chronically homeless or at risk of homelessness. The program will be financed through a \$2 billion dollar bond secured by a portion of future Proposition 63, the Mental Health Services Act of 2004, mental health revenues. An Advisory Committee will assist HCD to implement the program, and the committee will include an administrative officer of a city in California, to be appointed by the Governor.

The No Place Like Home Program supports a "housing first" strategy, guided by the core belief that no individual or family in California should ever experience the uncertainty and pain of living without a home. Many homeless advocates and social service experts prefer this approach which has been used successfully in other states because it provides safe, secure housing that creates an environment that allows for wrap-around services, such as mental health treatment.

Because of the strong link to community mental health services, which are provided principally by counties in California, the \$2 billion in grant funds will flow through counties. All 58 counties will be eligible to receive funds.

Cities are strongly encouraged to work closely with their counties to develop and support these supportive housing projects, and county applications will likely be more competitive if they demonstrate strong partnerships between counties and cities.

We anticipate more information about the program will be distributed by HCD later this year.

In addition to the \$2 billion bond, our recently enacted state budget also includes \$150 million for major funding initiatives to combat homelessness:

- *Supplemental Security Income Program (SSI/SSP) outreach*, to increase participation among homeless persons with disabilities who may be eligible for disability benefits programs.
- *Emergency Solutions Grants*, for activities eligible under the Federal Emergency Solutions Grant Program, which your department administers, including rapidly rehousing individuals and families, preventing families and individuals from becoming homeless, engaging homeless individuals and families living on the street, and operating homeless shelters and providing essential services to shelter residents.



- *CalWORKS Housing Support Program*, to provide assistance to eligible families who are homeless or at risk of homelessness.
- *CalWORKS Homeless Assistance*, to reflect elimination of the once-in-a-lifetime restriction on receipt of temporary and permanent homeless assistance and instead making this assistance available once every 12 months.
- “*Bringing Families Home*,” to establish a county matching grant program to reduce homelessness among families who are part of the child welfare system.

I urge you to closely follow the implementation of the \$2 billion homeless housing bond and these other programs, and to begin laying the groundwork with your counties to apply for the state funding.

I recognize that the problem of homelessness really has to be solved by *local government officials*, and the California Senate and our state government colleagues looks forward to partnering with you in these efforts.

Law enforcement agencies send officers to Dallas

Eight from the Garden Grove Police Department were among those traveling to pay their respects.

GARDEN GROVE • Congratulations was the wrong word for the moment.

Still, when he heard it, Garden Grove police Sgt. Richard Burillo shook his

fellow officers' hands and allowed himself a quick, reflective smile.

He and seven other Garden Grove police officers traveled to Dallas last weekend. They and law officers from across Orange County mourned five Dallas

lawmen killed by a gunman last week as they patrolled an until-then peaceful protest.

"When you lose someone in the line of duty, it's like you lost a family member," Burillo said after his name was one of eight out of about 30 officers' names pulled from a hat July 12.

Burillo, a shift commander and father of five, had tears as he spoke about the fallen Dallas officers.

He was at his son's Little League game when his 25-year-old daughter messaged him about the shooting. His thoughts raced: What's happening? How could it happen? Why?

After the game, he sent his youngest kids, ages 9 and 10, away from the television and watched the chaos unfold.

"It was surreal," he said.

"It was disbelief. "I didn't want my kids to see that," he said of the live coverage. "They know I'm a police officer."

The Garden Grove Police Association paid for the eight officers to go to Dallas, a bill of several thousand dollars, and is planning a donation or other type of support for the families.

Cpl. Brian Dalton, association president, said he and a fellow member agreed almost immediately July 7 as the shooting raged that they should send officers to Dallas. The next day, the full board of directors approved.

The officers left Friday and stayed for the funeral of Officer Patrick Zamarrilla on Saturday.

"This could happen in our community tomorrow or the next day," said Dalton, a 17-year member of the force. "We have a connection with officers around the country."

Dalton said the association would have liked to have representatives attend all the funerals of the fallen officers, but because they are on different days, the logistics didn't work out.

The Garden Grove Police Department sends officers to any local funeral for police and has sent them to Oakland and New York, as well as other cities. This time, when the association decided to send officers, about 30 people volunteered - more than it can afford to send.

Five Garden Grove officers have died while on duty, according to Lt. Robert Bogue, more than any other municipal agency in Orange County.

For Dalton, it may be even more personal. His father retired as a lieutenant for Garden Grove police and, as a child, Dalton

met two of the officers, Howard Dallies and Michael Rainford, who would later die in the line of duty.

Dalton said the mix of emotions flooding him as he watched TV news reports about the Dallas shootings was overwhelming, both sorrow and pride in how the officers responded.

"You saw the crowd running away from the gunfire," he said. "And the officers

running in the other direction. So there is pride in the officers that they can do that."

But, he added, there also is a sense of powerlessness.

"You're a world away," Dalton said. "You want to be there to help out your brothers."

Other Orange County law enforcement agencies sent officers to Dallas. Some of the officers paid their own way, while others received free plane tickets from airlines or got funding from police associations or their agencies.

The Huntington Beach Police Department had at least three officers in Dallas, and the Orange County Sheriff's Department was represented by two deputies.

"When tragedies like this occur in our greater law enforcement family, it's important to show up and be present," said Lt. Mark Stichter, a sheriff's spokesman. "We can't think of a more important thing to do."

Garden Grove startup will bring a sleeping space to you

Who says only children should take naps? A local start-up believes anyone can take a nap - in its mobile sleeping pods.

Kevin Pham, a 31-year-old Garden Grove resident, studied nap culture in countries like Japan and Vietnam. He found that a short nap can help workers feel refreshed, more productive, creative and focused.

Pham has a master's in business administration from Cal State Fullerton. In 2014, he came up with the idea for Nappify and launched the concept with \$100,000 crowdfunded from family and friends.

Pham's mobile model can venture to universities and companies. A nap session costs around \$13 or \$7 for students. After each session, the mattress sheet cover and pillow case are changed.

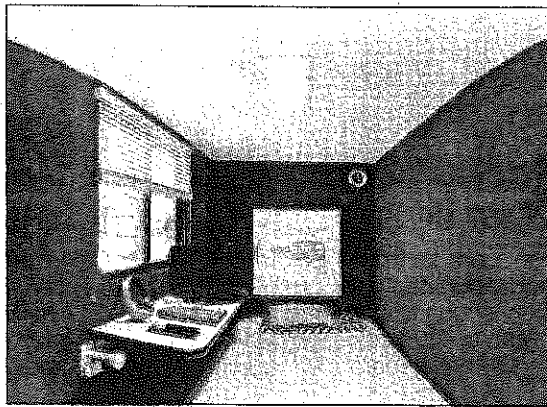
Pham debuted his Nappify trailer at Santa Ana College during final exams. Students were able to take a power nap when they needed a break from studying. Pham said students enjoyed the pods and felt refreshed after their naps.

Nappify looks like a modified trailer with a small lobby and four sleeping pods stacked two on two. The pods are sound-proof and have folding tables and reading lights. No food is allowed.

The trailer plugs into buildings to power its air conditioning system. Eventually, Pham plans to have eight pods per trailer. Each trailer costs \$40,000 to build, he said.

Right now, Nappify has just one trailer, but Pham hopes to expand. He's exploring ways of growing the business, both internally and with investors.

GG mayor gets Hispanic support in congressional bid

After a decent finish in California's primary election on June 7, Garden Grove Mayor Bao Nguyen has picked up steam, gaining a coveted endorsement from Lyo Figueroa, President of the Orange County Hispanic Bar Association.

Figueroa joins a long list of other prominent Latinos in law in their support for Mayor Nguyen's bid for Congress (46th District), including Sergio C. Garcia, California's first undocumented immigrant lawyer, Eric Dominguez, a leading immigration lawyer and president-elect of the bar associa-

tion, and past president of the bar association Diana Lopez.

Figueroa offered the following words on Bao:

Nguyen also picked up endorsements from former presidents of the bar association Jose Gonzalez and Mayte Santacruz. Gonzalez expressed strong support for Nguyen:

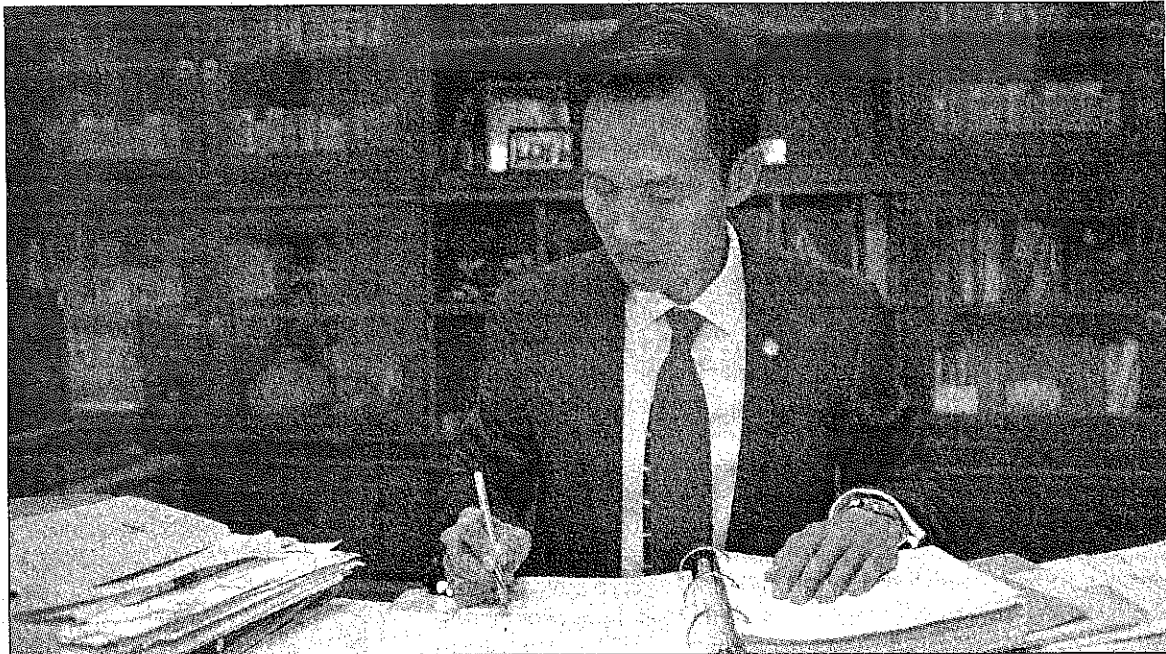

 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE ESTABLISHING THE AMOUNT OF MONEY FOR PARAMEDIC SERVICES THAT MUST BE RAISED BY AN AD VALOREM TAX OVERRIDE AND THE SETTING OF THE TAX RATE OF SAID OVERRIDE
 THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF GARDEN GROVE DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: In June 1974, over sixty percent (60%) of the Garden Grove voters approved an ad valorem tax override to provide emergency medical care service (Paramedic Services) to the community and thereby incurring a debt consisting of personnel and equipment payment obligations.

SECTION 2: Property taxes for indebtedness approved by the voters prior to July 1, 1978, are authorized pursuant to Section 93 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

SECTION 3: The City Council of the City of Garden Grove hereby declares it is necessary to raise an estimated \$8,799,000 through the use of an ad valorem tax override on the taxable property within the City of Garden Grove to maintain and pay for the emergency medical care services. Such indebtedness to be paid includes personnel salaries, training costs, equipment purchases, and maintenance of all equipment acquired previously for paramedic services purpose.

SECTION 4: The tax rate for the authorized ad valorem tax override as approved by voters of all assessable real and personal property for the Fiscal Year 2016-17 shall be 7.0 cents (\$.070) per one-hundred dollars (\$100) of assessed valuation, using as a basis the value of the property as assessed and equalized by the County of Orange, State of California, and shown on the 2016-17 assessment roll of said county.

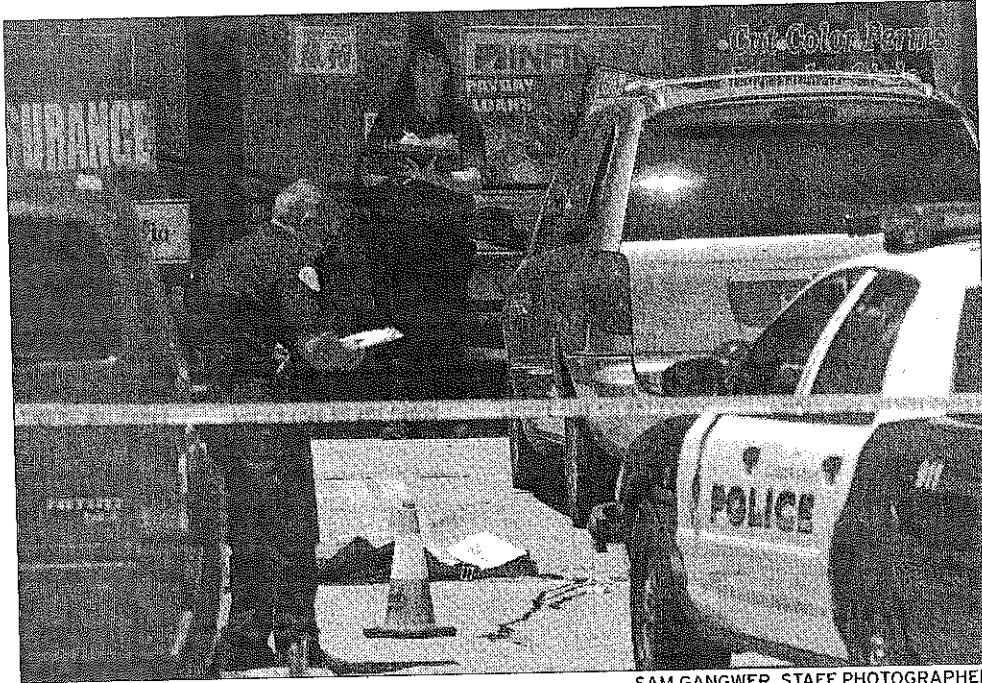

Man, 30, dead after shooting in Garden Grove strip mall

Crime happened after argument at busy mall, police say.

GARDEN GROVE • A 30-year-old man was fatally shot in the chest and face at noon Monday in a restaurant-heavy strip mall at Harbor Boulevard and Trask Avenue that was teeming with people eating lunch, police

said.

The man had gotten into an argument with the suspected shooter, a man who was about 30 years old, police said.

When the spat began, the victim was in a gray SUV in a parking lot. It was unclear if the suspect was in a vehicle or on foot.

After the shooting, the suspect took off in the victim's SUV and drove north on Harbor.

It was unclear if the crime was a carjacking or something more complex,

Garden Grove police Lt. Bob Bogue said Monday.

"We don't exactly know what happened," he said. "It doesn't sound like a typical carjacking."

The dead man, who was not identified, was with a girlfriend. Police interviewed her and looked at security-camera footage from nearby businesses, Bogue said.

Her account did not match up with the video, the lieutenant said.

Police also interviewed other witnesses.

KNOTT, VALLEY VIEW TO UNDERGO STREET IMPROVEMENTS

Knott Street, from Garden Grove Boulevard to Lampson Avenue, is set to undergo street improvements beginning Tuesday, July 26, 2016 through October. Also, a small segment on Valley View Street, from the 22 Freeway westbound off-ramp to Tiffany Avenue, is tentatively set to undergo improvements from August through December.

Updates and construction dates will be posted weekly on the City's Facebook and Twitter.

Motorists are advised that traffic on Knott and Valley View streets will be reduced to one lane to facilitate construction work. Work hours are 7:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. There will be no parking allowed in the construction zone. Access to businesses and residences along the construction area will be maintained at all times.

The improvements at both locations consist of full depth roadway reclamation and cement treatment, full depth asphalt replacement, replacement of curb and gutter, bus pad and handicap ramps, installation of video detection system, traffic signal detector loops, and installation of irrigation and landscaping.

Knott, Valley View to Undergo Street Improvements

Valley View Street, from Tiffany Avenue to Chapman Avenue was reconstructed in 2014. This small segment was not included in the 2014 project, due to its location within the Caltrans right-of-way. The segment was later determined to be the City's responsibility per a maintenance agreement with Caltrans.

The Garden Grove City Council awarded the \$2 million project to RJ Noble Company of Orange on Tuesday, June 14, 2016. The street rehabilitation project is included in the 2015-16 Capital Improvement Budget and is funded by federal Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP), Measure M2, and local and gas tax funds.

FOUND IN GARDEN GROVE**
City Encourages Community to Take Precautions

The Orange County Mosquito and Vector Control District (OCMVCD) has informed City officials of the confirmation of the first mosquito sample infected with the West Nile virus in Garden Grove. The mosquitoes were collected in mosquito traps from a residential neighborhood near Garden Grove Boulevard and Newhope Street.

OCMVCD teams will be posting public health advisories in the area and alerting residents to the detection of WNV, and offering information on preventative measures against mosquitoes and WNV.

The City of Garden Grove encourages the community to take extra steps to protect themselves from mosquitoes, especially from dawn to dusk when mosquitoes are most active.

Food gift I love to give: Pickled vegetables

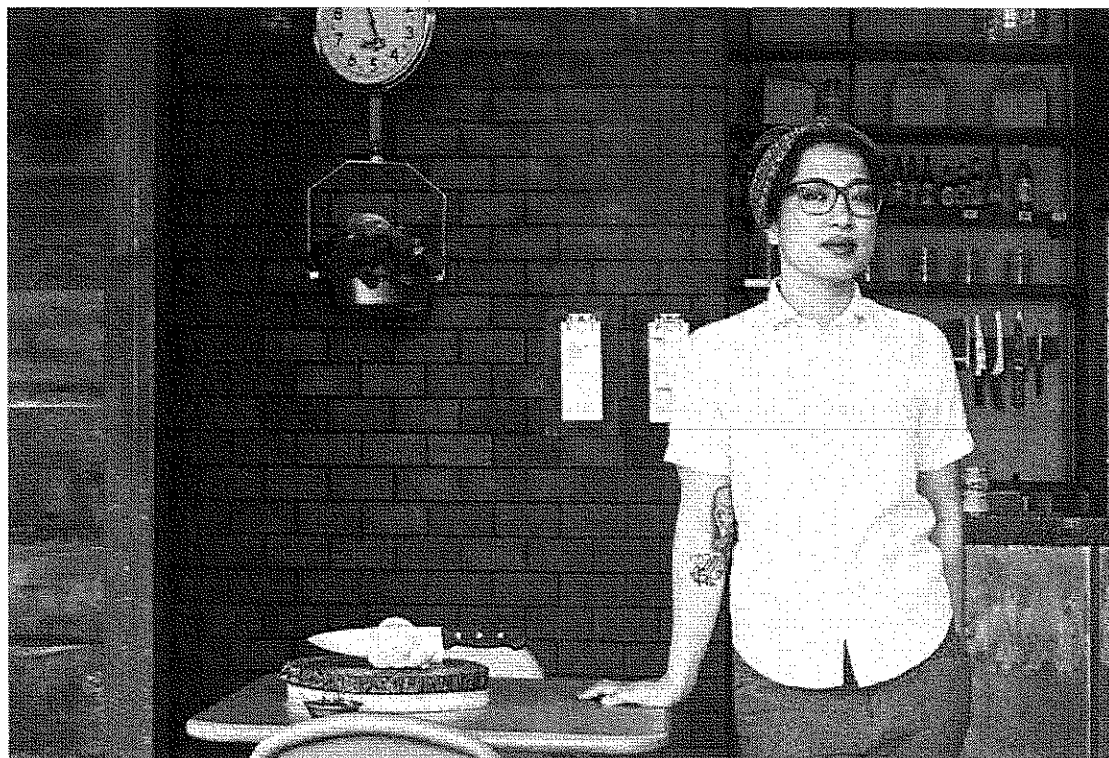

it the first day or 30 days from now, and the flavors change each day. It takes on new life and makes the dish just a bit more interesting.

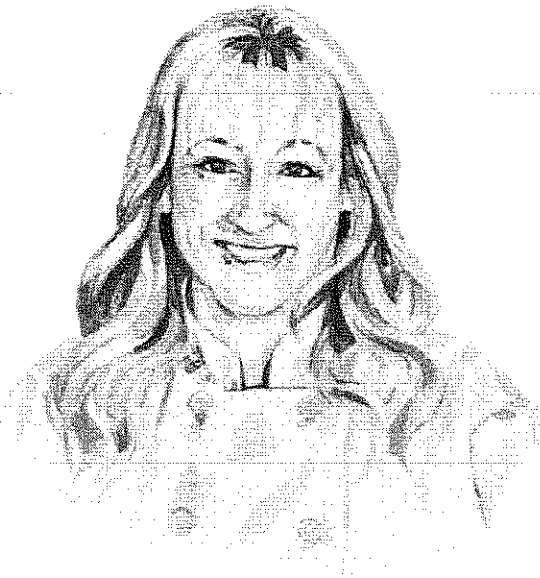
A new restaurant I can't wait to try: I recently watched Amar Santana on "Top Chef." I would love to try his new restaurant, Vaca.

Applicant: Karie Barker

Request: Conditional Use Permit approval to operate a new 1,850 square foot after-school tutoring center for 46 students and six (6) instructors. The site is in the GGMU1 (Garden Grove Mixed Use 1) zone. The project is exempt pursuant to CEQA Section 15301 – Existing Facilities.

MATTERS FROM COMMISSIONERS:

Commissioner Zamora asked for parking enforcement on Taft Street adjacent to Costco; that a list of projects be available on the City's website; and if there had been discussions regarding loosening regulations for entertainment on Main Street. Sergeant Vaicaro responded that with more specific information, a patrol memo could be issued for this area. Staff noted that the City's website was updated quarterly with a list of projects. The Main Street business owners would need to request consideration on entertainment regulations.

Commissioner Paredes stated that he attended an Active Streets meeting and noted that there were some neighborhood streets that had neither sidewalks nor street lighting. He stated that he understood that Garden Grove bus shelters were maintained by the City, and suggested the shelters be consistently maintained and designed to encourage ridership. He asked about a study for historical properties. In response, staff commented that in those areas without sidewalks, residents had expressed a desire to maintain a rural character, and that residents would need to request sidewalks. The City would then need to allocate funding for sidewalks, and that the street lighting was installed by Southern California Edison. The residents would have to pay for street lighting and the maintenance. Funding would be necessary to conduct a study for historical properties, and suggested that it would be a good class project for a University to identify eligible properties.

Commissioner Margolin commented on an email she received from the owner of the McDonald's restaurant on Valley View Street requesting the City intervene with the Gas Company, as the completion of the restaurant's renovation was waiting on inspection. Staff noted that the City was being proactive on this project and was assisting the owner with outstanding issues.

Commissioner Barker suggested that the City limit residential occupancy based on square footage; that the City's website provide a common list of code violations; that mailers be provided to explain code violations; and that the Street Sweeping Parking

Compliance Officers cite lawn parking. He asked when the Royal Palm neighborhood became a gated community, and the parameters for second units on single-family properties. In response, staff noted that the California Courts have determined that a family could not be defined, and therefore, limiting the number of people who reside in a home was not enforceable; however, for residential projects funded by government subsidies, there was an occupancy limit. Street Sweeping Parking Compliance Officers may not be designated to enforce the Municipal Code. The Royal Palm neighborhood created a Homeowners Association and subsequently installed a security gate. Second units in single-family residential zoning have to meet lot size and setback requirements.

Commissioner Nugyen asked how a residential property could be converted to a mixed use. Staff responded that the property would need to be located in a mixed use zone.

Vice Chair Kanzier asked if the City had removed Stage 2 drought requirements; and suggested installing bike racks along Garden Grove Boulevard. Staff stated that the City was still in Stage 2 drought requirements.

COMMISSIONER ZAMORA LEFT THE MEETING AT 8:10 P.M.

MATTERS FROM STAFF:

Staff noted that there was one Public Hearing item scheduled for July 21, 2016, and that the August 18, 2016, meeting would be cancelled.

Staff provided a PowerPoint presentation on the Brown Act and Conflict of Interest Laws. Commissioners and staff discussed and received input on the subject.

League Updates 2016 Hot and Priority Bills List

The League's 2016 Hot and Priority Bills List is now updated to reflect the status of significant legislation following the Legislature's adjournment for summer recess. The Legislature will return on Aug. 1 to complete all work of the 2015-16 legislative session by Aug. 31. This marks the final chance for cities lend their voice on legislation before it goes before Gov. Jerry Brown for final action.

Several bills have been removed from the previous list because they either were stopped or are not expected to move forward this year; others have been added.

The League routinely takes positions on bills throughout the legislative session. Bills tracked by the League are marked as "watch" until such time that a policy position is taken. Typically, bill positions are taken early in the year on bills for which the League has standing policy. These policy positions are found in the League's *Summary of Existing Policy and Guiding Principles*. Bills identified by the League without a standing policy are referred to one or more of the League's eight policy committees for a policy recommendation and the board of directors for a full position.

All League position letters and select sample letters can be found under the bill number in the bill search function at www.cacities.org/billsearch.

Support or Support If Amended

AB 806 (Dodd) Economic Development.

Clarifies that loan, lease and sale agreements and property acquisition are included in the range of options a community may employ to advance economic development. Authorizes communities to acquire and dispose of properties to create economic opportunities.

Status: Senate Floor

AB 1575 (Bonta) Medical Marijuana: Clean-up.

Improves implementation of the Medical Marijuana Regulation and Safety Act of 2015 (MMRSA). Clarifies that a local permit or authorization must be obtained before applying for a state license. Also clarifies that local ordinances are exempt from review by the Secretary of Food and Agriculture under the California Seed Law. Requires state standards for delivery drivers, and uniform packaging and labelling.

Status: Senate Appropriations Committee

HOT AB 1591 (Frazier) Transportation Funding.

While AB 1591 is unlikely to move this year, it remains on the priority bill list because the author has indicated that he will be introducing a similar transportation funding proposal in the special session that would raise between \$6 and \$7 billion annually for transportation funding.

Status: Assembly Transportation

AB 1719 (Rodriguez) CPR Training in High School.

Requires the governing board of a school district and the governing body of a charter school to offer instruction in *compression-only cardiopulmonary resuscitation* to students in grades 9–12. Provides immunity from liability for civil damages to local agencies, entities of state or local government, public employees, or public or private entities that authorize, support or supervise such instruction.

Status: Senate Appropriations Committee

AB 2220 (Cooper) – Elections in Cities: By or From District.

Allows cities regardless of population size to switch to district-based elections by ordinance.

Status: Senate Floor

AB 2444 (E. Garcia) California Parks, Water, Climate, and Coastal Protection and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2016.

Places a \$3.12 billion bond on the November 2016 ballot. Includes \$450 million for city, county, and regional parks awarded on a per capita basis.

Status: Senate Appropriations

AB 2492 (Alejo and Garcia) Community Revitalization Investment Authorities.

Provides helpful clean up to several aspects of the Community Revitalization Investment Authority (CRIA) tool enacted by last year's AB 2 (Alejo and Garcia).

Status: Senate Floor

AB 2594 (Gordon) Stormwater Capture and Use.

Allows a public agency that captures storm water, in accordance with a storm water resources plan, to use the captured water.

Status: Senate Appropriations

HOT AB 2817 (Chiu) Low-Income Housing Tax Credits: Allocation Increase.

Increases the annual allocation of Low Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTCs) from \$70 to \$300 million per year.

Status: Senate Appropriations

HOT ACA 4 (Frazier) Local Government Transportation Projects: Special Taxes: Voter Approval.

Lowers the voter threshold to impose, extend, or increase a sales and use tax or transactions use tax for transportation funding from two-thirds vote to 55 percent voter approval.

Status: Assembly Appropriations

SB 817 (Roth) City Incorporations.

Assists, through a property tax adjustment, four recently incorporated cities harmed by prior Vehicle License Fee takeaways.

Status: Assembly Appropriations Suspense File

HOT SB 873 (Beall) Sales of Low-Income Housing Tax Credits (LIHTCs).

Allows a developer who receives an award of state LIHTCs to sell the credits to an investor without requiring the investor to be part of the ownership entity. The measure increases the value of LIHTCs and largely eliminates the federal tax impacts associated with investors claiming state credits.

Location: Assembly Appropriations

SB 879 (Beall) Housing Bond.

Establishes the Affordable Housing Bond Act of 2016, which authorizes the sale of \$3 billion in general obligation bonds, upon approval by voters at the Nov. 8, 2016 statewide general election. Creates the Affordable Housing Bond Act Trust Fund of 2016 (Fund), and states the Legislature's intent that all bond proceeds be deposited in the Fund.

Status: Assembly Appropriations Suspense File

HOT SBX1-1 (Beall) Transportation Funding.

Generates about \$4.5 billion annually for transportation for state highways and local streets and roads maintenance.

Status: Senate Appropriations

Oppose or Oppose Unless Amended

AB 626 (Chiu) Public Contracts: Claim Resolution.

Creates a new claims resolution process whereby contractors could potentially make a claim for any and every dispute that may arise over the course of a public works contract.

Status: Senate Appropriations

AB 650 (Low) Public Utilities Commission: Regulation of Taxicabs.

Shifts away all local (city/county) regulatory authority to the CPUC in an attempt to “level the playing field” between the taxi and transportation network company (TNC – i.e. Uber/Lyft) industries.

Status: Senate Appropriations

AB 1217 (Daly) Orange County Fire Authority.

Interferes with the governance of a joint powers authority (JPA) to codify a prohibition on including alternate members within the composition of the JPA's Board of Directors.

Status: Senate Floor

AB 1643 (Gonzalez) Workers Compensation Disability Apportionment.

Eliminates the apportionment process for permanent disability through the workers compensation system for specific non-workplace related conditions.

Status: Senate Appropriations

AB 1934 (Santiago) Development Bonuses: Mixed-use Projects.

Creates a development bonus for commercial developers that partner with an affordable housing developer to construct a joint project or two separate projects encompassing affordable housing.

Status: Senate Appropriations

AB 2298 (Weber) Criminal Gangs.

Requires notice be given to adults whose names are entered onto the CalGang database. Provides for an appeal process resulting from the initial notification, if an individual wishes to contest his/her inclusion on the database. Requires automatic removal from the database if there has been no conviction of an individual within three years.

Status: Senate Appropriations

HOT AB 2299 (Bloom) Second Units.

Requires every city and county, including charter cities, to adopt an ordinance that provides for the creation of second units and repeals the ability of local governments to enact ordinances banning second units. Also requires the second unit ordinance to: designate areas where second units are permitted; impose standards such as parking, lot coverage, setbacks, and architectural review; and provide that second units do not exceed the allowable density for the lot upon which it is located. The ordinance cannot impose parking standards on second units that are located within: (1) one-half mile of public transit or shopping, or (2) a historic district.

Status: Senate Appropriations

HOT AB 2586 (Gatto) Parking.

Deletes the Jan. 1, 2017 sunset which prohibits cities from ticketing vehicles at broken parking meters. Requires that cities make parking immediately available upon the commencement of street sweeping. Prohibits cities from providing quota or other contract incentives when contracting out for parking enforcement.

Status: Senate Appropriations

AB 2693 (Dababneh) Property Assessed Clean Energy Program (PACE).

Establishes extensive disclosure and transparency requirements for PACE participants.

Status: Senate Floor

HOT AB 2835 (Cooper) Mandated Union Orientation Training.

Requires that local agencies provide employee unions 30 minutes of orientation time paid by the employee within the first hour of an employer's orientation. Employees are required to attend. Employer must provide name, job title, department, work location, telephone number and home address of any new employee within seven days of the date of hire to the recognized employee union. Orientations must be held every two months.

Status: Senate Appropriations

SB 897 (Roth) Workers Compensation '4850' Expansion.

Expands '4850' time by one additional year for police and firefighters in the event of a catastrophic injury at the hands of another while on duty.

Status: Assembly Floor

SB 1000 (Leyva) General Plans: Environmental Justice.

Requires cities and counties to incorporate environmental justice concerns into their general plans upon the next revision of two or more elements.

Status: Assembly Appropriations

HOT SB 1069 (Wieckowski) Second Units (Accessory Dwelling Units).

Restricts a local agency's ability to impose requirements on second units (renamed "accessory dwelling units" or ADUs). The measure restricts a local agency from applying parking standards for an ADU that is located within one-half mile of public transit or shopping, places limitations on how utility connection fees may be imposed for ADUs, and requires local agencies to take action on ADU applications within shortened timelines.

Status: Assembly Appropriations

SB 1170 (Wieckowski) Public Contracts: Water Pollution Prevention Plans: Delegation.

Prohibits public agencies (except the state) from delegating to a contractor the responsibility for developing a stormwater pollution prevention plan (SWPPP) or assuming responsibility for its accuracy or completeness.

Status: Assembly Appropriations

SB 1387 (de León) South Coast Air Quality Management District (SCAQMD).

Adds three new voting members to SCAQMD. These new members are appointed by the Governor, Assembly Speaker, and Senate Rules Committee.

Status: Assembly Appropriations

Concerns

SB 1029 (Hertzberg) Debt Reporting

Requires annual information on the status of local debt to be reported to the State Treasurer's California Debt and Investment Advisory Commission.

Status: Assembly Appropriations

SB 1298 (Hertzberg) Local Government: Fees and Charges

Defines "sewer service" in the Proposition 218 Omnibus Implementation Act.

Status: Assembly Floor

SB 1383 (Lara) Short-Lived Climate Pollutants

Requires ARB, no later than January 1, 2018, to approve and begin implementing a comprehensive strategy to reduce emissions of short-lived climate pollutants to achieve a 40% reduction in methane and hydrofluorocarbon gases, and a 50 percent reduction in anthropogenic black carbon below 2013 levels by 2030.

Status: Assembly Appropriations
