Dear Senator and Assemblymembers:

On behalf of the City of Garden Grove, I am writing to request your support in sponsoring or advocating for legislation amending Government Code 36502 to establish a 30-day residency requirement for candidates for elective office, or authorizing general law cities to enact such a residency requirement as requested by the City Council.

General law cities are currently preempted by Government Code 36502, which provides that to qualify as a council member, a person must be a registered voter of the city at the time nomination papers are issued. At the same time, we found that charter cities are not bound by Government Code 36502 and can enact and benefit from 30-day residency requirements for candidates for elective office.

Having the ability to establish a 30-day residency requirement for city council candidates would help prevent the appearance of impropriety whereby a candidate may appear to move into a district solely to seek election and not in the district's best interest. The democratic process is strengthened when residents feel they are voting for council members who truly live in their neighborhoods and understand their needs and concerns.

County of Orange Announces First Regional COVID-19 Super POD at Disneyland Resort

Santa Ana, Calif. (January 11, 2021) – In a vital step to help battle the spread of COVID-19, the County of Orange has established the first large Point-of-Dispensing (POD) site to provide COVID-19 vaccines to residents at Disneyland Resort in Anaheim.

"The Disneyland Resort, the largest employer in the heart of Orange County, has stepped up to host the county's first Super POD site – undertaking a monumental task in our vaccination distribution process," said acting Chairman Andrew Do, First District. "We truly appreciate the support of the Orange County Fire Authority, our cities, and our residents as we continue to rollout COVID-19 vaccinations throughout the county."

Known as "Super POD" sites, the five regional Super PODs will have the capacity to vaccinate thousands of residents each day. The Super PODs will increase efficiency and provide multiple vaccine distribution points throughout Orange County. The County will announce additional Super POD sites as agreements are finalized.

"I'm proud to have Disneyland Resorts and the City of Anaheim, both in my Fourth District, be the first of the Super POD sites in Orange County," said Supervisor Doug Chaffee. "Residents in my district have been highly impacted by COVID-19. These Super PODs are absolutely critical in stopping this deadly virus."

Vaccine distribution is managed through a phased, tiered approach established by the California Department of Public Health (CDPH). Currently, vaccinations are available to Orange County residents and those who work in Orange County who meet the criteria for what is referred to as "Phase 1a, all tiers." This group includes law enforcement first responders in high-risk communities and was recently expanded to include those age 75 and older. We are excited to serve this group as a priority population. The County is working in collaboration with community partners to create a process that reaches seniors close to home and best serves these individuals.

"It's important to vaccinate as many willing people as possible for COVID-19, and we need the space to do it," said Supervisor Donald P. Wagner, Third District. "I thank Disneyland Resort and the City of Anaheim for stepping up in the shared effort to give OC residents protection against the virus."

The first Super POD at the Disneyland Resort will be operational later this week. Most of those eligible to be vaccinated in Phase 1a will be contacted through their employer to schedule an appointment via a third-party app developed in cooperation with the County of Orange.



"In order to ensure a smooth and effective distribution of the vaccine as quickly as possible, it is so important that Orange County residents have the information they need on who, and when, they are eligible to receive the vaccine, and where they can go to receive it," said Supervisor Lisa Bartlett, Fifth District. "We will have several sites across the county, including South County, and information on these locations will be available shortly. Please stay tuned to https://occovid19.ochealthinfo.com/covid-19-vaccination-distribution for the latest information on vaccine distribution sites. In the meantime, please remain vigilant and protect you and your loved ones by practicing social distancing, good hygiene and wearing your masks."

Only those identified under Phase 1a who have an appointment will receive a vaccination at the County's new Super POD locations. Individuals with appointments must provide identification and documentation of vaccine eligibility at the site. Walk-ups without an appointment cannot be accommodated. Given the limited initial supply of the COVID-19 vaccine, distribution will be limited at first and increased over time. The phased, tiered approach to vaccine distribution aims to reach critical populations to reduce morbidity and mortality rates due to the transmission of COVID-19.

"Coronavirus has brought both a public health crisis and economic devastation," said Anaheim Mayor Harry Sidhu. "With this super site, we will begin to overcome both. Every vaccination done in Anaheim will help to save lives and speed the reopening and recovery of our city."


Those interested in receiving the COVID-19 vaccine can view the phased tiers of eligibility and other important vaccination information at OC Health Care Agency's website, www.COVIDVaccineFacts.com. The success of the vaccination distribution plan and the Super POD sites is dependent on everyone understanding where they fall in the phased, tiered plan. Individuals attempting to receive a vaccine ahead of schedule will overload the system, making it even more challenging to meet this urgent need. We appreciate the public's patience and understanding.

The County, through its "Operation Independence," established a goal of completing all county vaccinations by July 4, 2021. An Incident Management Team (IMT) was established on December 31, 2020, for Operation Independence. The Operation Independence IMT is a unified command with representatives from the Orange County Health Care Agency, the Orange County Fire Authority, the County of Orange County Executive Office (CEO) and other County agencies.




The attached figures show the recent trend of water consumption in Orange County (OC), an estimate of Imported Water Sales for MWDOC, and selected water supply information.

- OC Water Usage, Monthly by Supply in November.


 OCWD Groundwater was the main supply in November.
- OC Water Usage, Monthly, Comparison to Previous Years Water usage in
 November 2020 was <u>slightly below average</u> compared to the last 5 years. We
 are projecting a slight decrease in overall water usage compared to FY 2019-20. It
 has been 44 months since all mandatory water restrictions were lifted by the
 California State Water Resources Control Board.
- Historical OC Water Consumption Orange County M & I water consumption is projected to be 523,000 AF in FY 2020-21 (this includes ~15 TAF of agricultural usage and non-retail water agency usage). This is about 11,000 AF less than FY 2019-20 and is about 8,000 AF more than FY 2018-19. Water usage per person is projected to be slightly lower in FY 2020-21 for Orange County at 146 gallons per day (This includes recycled water). Although OC population has increased 20% over the past two decades, water usage has not increased, on average. A long-term decrease in per-capita water usage is attributed mostly to Water Use Efficiency (water conservation) efforts. O.C. Water Usage for the last five Fiscal Years is the lowest since the 1982-83 Fiscal Year (FY 1982-83 was the third wettest year on record).

<u>Water Supply Information</u> Includes data on Rainfall in OC; the OCWD Basin overdraft; Northern California and Colorado River Basin hydrologic data; the State Water Project (SWP) Allocation, and regional storage volumes. The data have implications for the magnitude of supplies from the three watersheds that are the principal sources of water for OC. Note that a hydrologic year is Oct. 1st through Sept. 30th.

- Orange County's accumulated precipitation through early January was below average for this period. Water year to date rainfall in Orange County is 2.00 inches, which is 50% of normal.
- Northern California accumulated precipitation through early January was 39% of normal for this period. Water Year 2020 was 63% of normal while water year 2019 was 137% of normal. The Northern California snowpack was 53% as of December 30th. As of late December, 95.14% of California is experiencing moderate to exceptional drought conditions while 100.00% of the state is experiencing abnormally dry conditions. The State Water Project Contractors Table A Allocation was set at 10% in December 2020.
- Colorado River Basin accumulated precipitation through early December was 62% of normal for this period. The Upper Colorado Basin snowpack was 75% of normal as of January 4th. Lake Mead and Lake Powell combined have about 58% of their average storage volume for this time of year and are at 40.7% of their total capacity. If Lake Mead's level falls below a "trigger" limit 1,075 ft. at the end of a calendar year, then a shortage will be declared by the US Bureau of Reclamation (USBR), impacting Colorado River water deliveries to the Lower Basin states. As of early October, Lake Mead levels were 8.89' above the "trigger" limit. The USBR predicts that the start of 2020 will not hit the "trigger" level but there is a 0% chance that the trigger level will be hit in 2021 and a 23% chance in 2022.






Accumulated Precipitation

for the Oct.-Sep. water year, early January 2021








Two OC cities decry D.C. riot

Santa Ana blames and names Trump in resolution, but Garden Grove doesn't mention president

Officials representing two of Orange County's largest cities — Santa Ana and Garden Grove — passed resolutions officially condemning the violence that gripped the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6.

But even as the cities expressed similar opinions about the same event, their wording differed considerably.

In Santa Ana, the City Council unanimously agreed Tuesday on a resolution that "strongly" condemns the acts of "armed violence, domestic terrorism, and insurrection ... all as incited by President (Donald) Trump."

The president's words and actions are mentioned several times in Santa Ana's resolution, including his false insistence that the November election was "stolen" from Trump and his supporters because it resulted in a win for President-

- elect Joe Biden.
- Santa Ana Councilwoman Thai Viet Phan further amended the resolution to specify that "violent white supremacists and neo-Nazis" engaged in an "attempted coup" of the Capitol on Jan. 6.

Santa Ana Mayor Vicente Sarmiento and his colleagues agreed to the changes: "This wasn't a protest. This was an assault ... on the bastion of what represents our democracy."

In neighboring Garden Grove, council members took up a similar resolution but, arguing over its language, deleted any reference to Trump. They also debated whether a city council has a role in commenting on events in Washington, and they voted against an alternate reso-

lution, offered by Councilman George Brietigam, that would have lumped the attack on the Capitol with last year's protests about racism. Those protests were in reaction to the police killing of George Floyd, a black man who died after an officer knelt on his neck for nearly nine minutes. While most were peaceful, some devolved into rioting and looting.

"Either you condemn all domestic terrorism and violence or you support it, plain and simple," Brietigam told his colleagues. "It's wrong to condemn domestic terrorism and violence of the groups you don't agree with while winking and nodding and prodding the groups you do agree with."

His substitute ordinance lost, with only Councilman Phat Bui in support.

The Garden Grove ordinance that won approval condemns the attack on the Capitol from "hundreds of domestic terrorists" who pushed through barriers and "incited an insurrection." It's original wording, now deleted: "hundreds of pro-Trump protestors."

At the request of Councilman John O'Neill, they also edited this clause, "... these individuals tore down United States flags and replaced them with Trump flags," to exclude any mention of the Trump flags. By contrast, the Santa Ana resolution says: "The United States flag was desecrated and replaced with Trump and confederate flags."

Garden Grove Councilwoman Kim Nguyen, who along with Councilwoman Deidre Thu-Ha Nguyen introduced the resolution, said after the meeting that she was disappointed that the final version wasn't as strong as she would have liked.

Nguyen also disagreed with the idea that the siege on the Capitol, in which rioters sought to overturn the results of an election, can be equated with last summer's protests, which sought change within the democratic process.

"Those protesters were fighting for justice, equality, equity, and human rights, whereas the domestic terrorist attack on the nation's capitol was essentially a tantrum from individuals who felt the election was stolen," she said

Still, Nguyen said she's pleased that most of the council agreed to the resolution.

"At the end of the day, we passed a resolution that at the core of its message did what it needed to do, condemn the desecration of the Capitol building and the individuals who incited a domestic terrorist attack."

The Garden Grove coun-

cil voted 4-2 for the resolution, with Brietigeman and Bui voting against it. Mayor Steve Jones joined O'Neill, Diedre Nguyen and Kim Nguyen in supporting it. Councilwoman Stephanie Klopfenstein was absent.

On Wednesday, a day after the two cities passed their resolutions, the House of Representatives voted to impeach Trump for his role in inciting the insurrection.

NO-COST, WALK-UP COVID-19 TESTING SITES AVAILABLE IN GARDEN GROVE

The County of Orange and 360 Clinic will offer no-cost, walk-up COVID-19 testing to all Garden Grove and Orange County residents at two locations in Garden Grove. Garden Grove's walk-up testing sites are located in the Civic Center Park, near the City's H. Louis Lake Senior Center, at 11300 Stanford Avenue, and at Magnolia Park, at 11402 Magnolia Street. Testing will take place from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m., Mondays and Wednesdays, at 11300 Stanford Avenue, and Tuesdays and Thursdays, at 11402 Magnolia Street. Appointments are required and must be made online at www.360clinic.md, click on 'No Cost Testing.'

"With the heightened risks of contracting and spreading COVID-19, the City is committed to putting processes in place to help maintain community health and safety and bring us closer to getting an upper-hand on the virus," said Garden Grove Mayor Steve Jones.

Individuals with appointments must bring a valid picture ID with address and a cell phone to communicate with 360 Clinic staff during the testing process. Patients will receive a self-administered test kit, and must complete the self-administered test onsite and return the kit to 360 Clinic staff. Results will be sent by text message or email within 24 to 48 hours.

No-Cost, Walk-Up COVID-19 Testing Sites Available in Garden Grove 2-2-2

Patients must follow all COVID-19 health guidelines by wearing face coverings and maintain at least 6-feet of social distance from others outside their household.

Additional no-cost COVID-19 testing options are available throughout Orange County, including two drive-up testing super sites located at the Anaheim Convention Center, at 800 W. Katella Avenue, and the Costa Mesa Fairgrounds, at 1167 Arlington Drive, Gate 4. To make an appointment at a drive-up testing super site, visit occovid19.ochealthinfo.com/supersite.

The City continues to encourage residents to stay home when possible; wear face coverings in public spaces; social distance from those outside their household; and practice good personal hygiene habits.

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


